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19. Zoosanitary Certification Statements

I hereby certify that following due enquiry and to the best of my knowledge and belief, the animals identified below comply with the following statements:

- 19.1. The animals were born in the United States or Canada or were legally imported into Canada from a region recognized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) as a region not restricted due to BSE, and have been under no movement restrictions⁽¹⁾⁽²⁾ within Canada or the United States for at least 60 days prior to importation into the United States.
- 19.2. I have inspected the animals and found them to be free from any evidence of communicable disease and that, as far as can be determined, they have not been exposed to any such disease during the preceding 60 days.
- 19.3. Canada is free of foot-and-mouth disease, rinderpest, surra, and contagious bovine pleuropneumonia.
- 19.4. The animals were born on or after March 1, 1999 which is the date determined by APHIS to be the effective enforcement of a ruminant to ruminant feed ban.
- 19.5. The animals are not in guarantine in Canada.
- 19.6. The cattle⁽³⁾ have been permanently and humanely identified with a distinct and legible "CAN" mark⁽⁴⁾ that has been applied with a freeze brand or hot iron, and is easily visible on the live animal. The mark was applied to each animal's right hip, high on the tail head and is not less than two (2) inches or more than three (3) inches high. A tattoo bearing the letters "CAN" applied to the inside of the left ear is also acceptable; or any other alternative method approved by the USDA before the shipment reaches the port of entry into the U.S.
- 19.7. The cattle or bison are individually identified with an official Canadian (124) or USA (840) approved ear tag, applied prior to each animal's entry into the United States. In addition to the official Canadian or USA ear-tag, bison exported without a permanent mark must be identified with a secondary dangle tag bearing the same official number.
- 19.8. The animals are from a brucellosis-free province or territory or from a brucellosis free herd.
- 19.9. The animals have continuously resided in a tuberculosis (Mycobacterium bovis) free province or territory or region in Canada, or their U.S. equivalent e.g. tuberculosis accredited free or modified accredited advanced State or from a tuberculosis free herd.

Notes:

- (1) Animals imported into Canada from the United States and that remained within a feedlot in Canada approved by the CFIA to import restricted feeder cattle, are not considered "under restriction" with regards to this clause.
- (2) Animals that were under movement controls for investigation purposes, where the investigation has concluded, with no confirmation of the disease of concern for all animals within the herd of origin, and where all restrictions have been lifted by the CFIA, are not considered to have been "under restriction" with regards to this clause and are eligible for export the day that the CFIA releases them.
- (3) A permanent mark is mandatory for cattle but is not required for bison.
- (4) Animals legally imported into Canada from the USA are not required to have a CAN mark when re-exported if they were marked with "USA" prior to entering Canada.
- (5) USA 840 tags on animals imported from the USA into Canada should not be replaced with Canadian 124 tags, except in the rare event the tag was lost while the animal was in Canada.

VETERINARIANS

The USDA has recently confirmed that fax or electronic transmission of export certificates by accredited veterinarians was acceptable as long as the following conditions were met:

- Accredited veterinarians who wish to send export certificates to a district office via e-mail or by fax must first inform the district veterinarian of their intention and must provide the e-mail address or the fax number that will be used. Only e-mail addresses or fax numbers associated with the accredited veterinarian will be accepted.
- 2) Certificates received electronically must be printed on legal size paper. Before signing these certificates, endorsing CFIA veterinarians will ascertain that they contain a valid issuing signature and that it originated from an approved fax number or e-mail address.
- 3) The USDA has confirmed that certificates bearing a copy of the accredited veterinarian's signature will be accepted by their port of entry veterinarians. However, they must still bear an original stamp and an original signature from the CFIA veterinarian.
