

Import Protocol for Raptors from Canada by Land

November 2025

Definition

Raptors (*birds of prey; predatory birds*) are used in various ways by their owners, including hunting, exhibitions, and companionship. The APHIS definition of raptors includes, but is not limited to, falcons, hawks, eagles, vultures, and owls. The two categories for importation of raptors into the United States are captive (no free-flight) and free-flight.

General Requirements

Raptors from Canada

1. Canadian-origin raptors can be moved across land borders **without an import permit**.
2. A current veterinary health certificate for [commercial birds](#), issued by a full-time salaried veterinarian of Canada and endorsed by the Canadian competent authority (Canadian Food Inspection Agency [CFIA]) within 30 days of U.S. arrival, is required.
3. Raptors used for free-flight must have a both valid [commercial birds](#) health certificate **and** [addendum HA1945](#) issued by a full-time salaried veterinarian of Canada and endorsed by CFIA.

Raptors from the United States

1. U.S.-origin raptors can be moved across land borders **without an import permit**.
2. U.S.-origin captive raptors that have stayed in Canada for **less than 30 days** will not require a CFIA-issued import health certificate; however, a valid U.S.-issued export health certificate is required for re-entry into the United States.
3. U.S.-origin free-flight raptors that have stayed in Canada for **less than 30 days** will not require a CFIA-issued import health certificate **but** [addendum HA1945](#), issued by a full-time salaried veterinarian of Canada and endorsed by CFIA, is required.
4. U.S.-origin captive raptors that have stayed in Canada for **more than 30 days** will require a CFIA-issued import health certificate for [commercial birds](#).
5. U.S.-origin free-flight raptors that have stayed in Canada for **more than 30 days** will require a CFIA-issued import health certificate and [addendum HA1945](#), issued by a full-time salaried veterinarian of Canada and endorsed by CFIA.
6. Raptors that originate from or transit through a control zone established by the CFIA due to outbreaks of Newcastle disease or highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) or are currently under quarantine or have any restrictions to their movement are not eligible for import into the United States.

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Veterinary Port Inspection

1. A USDA port veterinarian must inspect commercial bird shipments at the first U.S. port of entry, unless otherwise indicated on the U.S. import permit.
2. The importer must arrange for an inspection at least 72 hours in advance by contacting the USDA port veterinarian, whose contact information is listed on the import permit.
3. The port veterinarian will visually inspect the shipment, export health certificate, and U.S. import permit. View [user fee](#) rates for inspection services.

Quarantine Requirements

Quarantine is not required for raptors from Canada importing into the United States by land.
